19th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Faith is the realization of what is hoped for. Hebrews 11:1

Scholars have argued over the years about who wrote the letter to the Hebrews in the Bible. However, we are sure of one important fact which is that the letter to the Hebrews brings about a chronological order of the Bible, from Creation of the World (Old Testament) to the Life of Christ (New Testament).

When the author of Hebrews calls faith the "realization of what is hoped for," he is talking about an ongoing realization of all that Jesus has won for us. Our faith is meant to be living and active, capable of growing as we welcome the Lord into our lives. So, what is faith? Faith is not blind. Faith is assurance. We *know-so* not just hope-so. It is a belief and conviction of things we have not seen.

In the Old Testament, God commanded the Jews to sacrifice a lamb and place its blood on the doors of their homes so that the Angel of Death would pass over their homes. Then they ate the lamb to seal their covenant with God. This Passover lamb is a foreshadowing of what was to come – the coming of the Son of God, Jesus—The Lamb of God.

At the Last Supper, the night before Jesus died, while celebrating the Jewish celebration of Passover with His Twelve Apostles, Jesus took bread and wine and said, "Take, this is my body... This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many." In this way Jesus gave us the most beautiful Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist and the first Mass. It is this sacrificial meal, the Holy Eucharist, which we consume at each Mass.

The Church teaches us that the sacrifice of Christ dying on the cross on Good Friday occurred "once for all." It cannot be repeated. Christ does not "die again" during Mass, but the very same sacrifice that occurred on Calvary is made present on the altar. That's why the Mass is not another sacrifice but a participation in the same, once-for-all sacrifice of Christ on the cross. The bread and wine really become by a miracle of God's grace, the actual body, blood, soul and divinity of Jesus. After the consecration of the bread and wine, no bread or wine remains – *only Jesus Himself*. What appears to be bread and wine, even the last speck of bread and the tiniest drop of wine, *is* the body and blood of Christ. Yes, *Christ is present, God and man, body and blood, soul and divinity*.

It is by God's greatest gift to us that the Holy Eucharist, Jesus' Body and Blood, also becomes our flesh and blood. Jesus gave us the Holy Eucharist not only so that the bread and wine will change but also that **we will change**. Christ dwells within us that we might become more Christ-like in our words and actions and more Christ-like in our attitudes and thoughts while offering our daily lives to God. When we receive the Body and Blood of Christ, Jesus lives in us. So, how can we become more Christ-like? Is there room in your heart to visit the sick, feed the hungry, pray for another, help the homeless, be a genuine friend to a lonely person, forgive someone who has hurt you or apologize to someone you have hurt?

God sent us His only Son, Jesus, so that we might see His presence in the flesh. In turn, Jesus gave us the Holy Eucharist, the most perfect manifestation of God's presence to His people. When we receive the Holy Eucharist, we are asking Jesus to open our eyes, minds and our hearts to His love and His wisdom in a new and deeper way.

It is by our growing faith, the belief of what we have not seen, and by receiving the Holy Eucharist that we truly embrace Jesus. May the greatest gift we can receive from God, Jesus in the Holy Eucharist, dwell within each and every one of our hearts so that we may realize the life-changing effects in our lives.
